

'It is in this context that a change of emphasis in the Church is discernible in recent initiatives. For example, there is a deep and serious consultation to discern the promptings of God in our heritage and in the People of God. The Task Force, which I established under the title, "Building Hope", is a step in that direction, as is the National Synod which was announced in March. What is now emerging is a different sense of "ownership" of the Church and its mission – from a "clergy-owned" to a Church truly "owned" by the People of God."

Water and Women: Water, Justice and Gender: Injustice around water does not affect all people equally. It is not just a contrast between the developed and developing worlds; the reality is that women and children are disproportionately impacted by poor access to clean water. Gender is a major factor in water and sanitation, for it is often women and girls who bear the burden of procuring water when it is scarce. Around the world, women and children spend an estimated 200 million hours every single day collecting water. In addition to danger and susceptibility to injury, children responsible for supplying water to their families are unable to attend school. When it comes to education, there is a direct link between access to clean water and attendance rates. How can a child study or concentrate when she is exhausted from carrying water over long distances? Education has transformed our country and provided opportunities for a fuller life in successive generations. Should not all children have access to this wonderful gift?"

Bus Connects Update: The Navan Road Community Council (NRCC) subcommittee is working on impacts of proposed National Transport Authority (NTA) Bus Connects - 'Blanchardstown to City Centre Core Bus Corridor route 5'. NRCC supports an enhanced public transport system to improve access to city centre, which should allow commuters to have a more frequent and efficient Bus service.

However, NRCC cannot agree with any proposal which reduces the Quality of Life of our neighbourhood. Under current proposals our Quality of Life along Navan Road, and throughout our area will be compromised by the removal of over 150 Street Trees; trees in some residential open spaces, including all trees up to Navan Road/Parkway Rail Station from the Roundabout at Ashtown; Compulsory Purchase of some front garden areas; the closing of through traffic along Old Cabra Road - to become local access only; the removal of grass verges along the Navan Road.

NRCC hope to arrange a Public information meeting in November, dependant on Covid Health situation. The exact date for this meeting will be circulated, via the Parish Newsletter and Social Media.

Note; Sunday Tribune article of 1/7/1998 "Pollutants pose health risk for Dubliners - a survey carried out at Rathmines; College Green and Ashtown Grove; air quality exceeding safety limits, with increased mortality rates from respiratory and other serious illness'. NRCC have regularly forwarded this information to Planning Departments to no avail. Our trees absorb an enormous amount of such pollutants.
